'Kagami-Biraki'

"Kagami Biraki" is a traditional ceremony in Japan and it is translates to "Opening the Mirror". Kagami refers to the lid of the Sake barrel and Biraki means "to open".

Because of the lid's round shape, Kagami is a symbol of harmony. The Kagami Biraki represents an opening to harmony and good fortune.

The Sake barrel Kagami-Biraki is said to trace its origins to another kind of Kagami-Biraki involving Mochi, "soft round rice cakes", which is performed to celebrate the first working day of the New Year. In the past, Samurai households would make an offering to the gods of a stack of mochi to represent the Kagami at New Year. The Mochi was cut up into pieces to represent the Biraki, or "opening," and eaten on January 11. Even today, many households and offices have this custom, placing Kagami-Mochi on their Kamidana at New Years.
